From the Desk of Rev. Fr. Angelo Maggos Parish Registry, Progress Report Upcoming Church Services and Events Youth Ministry and Organizations News

From Fr. Angelo

While every Holy Week and Resurrection service is beautiful, this year was especially memorable in that it was immensely joyful to see our church filled once again to celebrate this most important event of our Orthodox faith. COVID certainly has had an impact on all of our lives but going through the pandemic has restored the blessing of having us appreciate the importance of in-person community. The words of Genesis, "It is not good for man to be alone" God communicates His desire that we, His creation, are meant to be in communion with one another in a very personal and intimate way that cannot be reproduced through technology.

However for many in our community who are unable to have this in-person communion (homebound, hospitals or nursing homes, or health-related concerns) technology, via the livestreaming of our services, provides a way to maintain this important connection. And not just to a church, but OUR church and the people that they know. During this Holy Week Demos and I had many people tell us how grateful they are for our livestreaming as it gave their family members the opportunity to feel as though they are part of our community.

Returning to the theme of this year's Holy Week, I could not help but be moved seeing our church bathed in the light of hundreds of candles and the deafening joyful cries of Χριστος Ανεστη (Christ is Risen!) shattering the darkness. This year was especially memorable as we heard the words of our beautiful hymns sung in Greek, English, and Arabic reminding us of the universal nature of our Orthodox Christian faith.

Equally meaningful were the inspiring words of one of the greatest orators of our Orthodox Church, St. John Chrysostom. St John vividly reminds us of the glorious, joyful, and hopeful event that is Christ's Resurrection. He speaks to the heart of the salvific work accomplished by our Lord and Savior which is to once again restore the relationship we had with God in the Garden.

"Let no one grieve over his poverty, for the universal kingdom has been revealed; let no one weep over his sins, for pardon has shone from the grave; let no one fear death, for the death of our Savior has set us free: He has destroyed it by enduring it, He has despoiled Hades by going down into its kingdom."

The linchpin of our Christian faith is the belief in the ACTUAL DEATH and BODILY RESURRECTION of Jesus Christ. A resurrection where Christ, fully divine, one in essence with the Father and the Holy Spirit and yet fully human like us, died and resurrected as the example of what our renewed glorified form will be in God's everlasting kingdom. With this Truth as a solid foundation, we can endure history's many socalled "new revelations" of the faith without impact. In fact, St. Paul goes so far as to say that without the event of the Resurrection our faith is pointless.

"...But if there be no resurrection of the dead, then is Christ not risen: And if Christ be not risen, then our preaching is useless, and your faith is also useless." (1 Cor 15)

Christ Himself assures us of both His divinity and of God's mercy towards us saying "I am the resurrection. Anyone who believes in Me, even though that person dies, will live." (John 10:30 and 11:25) God's willingness to offer His only begotten Son for Man's salvation is the proof that we as Christians do not worship a transcendent God separate from His creation unable to partake in the suffering of His creation, as is the case in the gods of ancient Egypt, Greece, Rome and the Norse. God's condescension as Man, one of His own creations, brought Him directly into the history of Humanity offering us a real and personal encounter, both dur-

ing His life and after His resurrection. It is this personal encounter as Man that allows us to represent Christ in the iconography of the Church.

This is what St. Paul was saying when he preached to the Greeks in Athens regarding the identity of the Unknown God of their Gnostic faith (Acts 17). Through Christ's birth God was man manifest in human history and through Christ's BODILY resurrection mankind has been given the chance to redeem that which was lost by Adam; life everlasting in the new Eden.

Through Christ our Lord, we have been freely given through His Suffering and Grace, total and complete victory over death by the power of death to which Chrysostom so boldly responded with $\varepsilon\pi\iota\kappa\rho\acute{\alpha}\nu\theta\eta$! Let us therefore in the same boldness and joy join St. John Chrysostom when he states:

"O death, where is your sting? O Hades, where is your victory? Christ is risen and life is freed, Christ is risen and the tomb is emptied of the dead ...O Hades, you have been vexed $\varepsilon\pi$ ικράνθη by encountering Him in the nether world. "Hades is vexed $\varepsilon\pi$ ικράνθη because frustrated, it is vexed $\varepsilon\pi$ ικράνθη because it has been mocked, it is vexed $\varepsilon\pi$ ικράνθη because it has been destroyed, it is vexed $\varepsilon\pi$ ικράνθη because it has been reduced to naught. So let us all ...as Pious men and all lovers of God rejoice in the splendor of this [Paschal] feast; ... let those who have borne the burden of Lent now receive their pay, and those who have toiled since the first hour, let them now receive their due reward."

As some of you have already heard, last Friday at about 4:30pm there was an unsuccessful attempt to steal my Kia Sportage. While they were not able to steal the vehicle it was vandalized. This is unfortunately the third incident of vandalism at our church. There have also been suspicious vehicles "patrolling" our parking lot both at night and during the day.

Our church is certainly not the only area in Rochester where these crimes are occurring and they have been happening with increased frequency. I am writing this information not to scare anyone but to be sure that we are extra vigilant when exiting and entering our vehicles.

In response to this new reality the Parish Council and I have initiated several measures of increased security for everyone's safety.

- 1. Our church is outfitted with five (5) outside cameras which record live 24/7 every day and thus we are able to capture criminal incidents and suspicious behavior.
- 2. The Parish Council secured the services of a security watchman who was posted at our rear parking lot each evening of Holy Week and we are discussing security options moving forward.
- 3. We are working with two parishioners well experienced in security protocols and the Rochester Police dept to create a current security manual that outlines what measures need to be taken for various scenarios that could present a hazard.
- 4. We require that all entrance doors, whether church or hall MUST NOT BE PROPPED OPEN.
- 5. We encourage all of you that if you see suspicious activity do not hesitate to call 911 and report this to those who are on Narthex duty.



From the Desk of the Annunciation Youth Director

When I accepted the role of Youth Director, I was met with much support and a list of challenges on the table. We have been blessed with a robust Sunday School program, active GOYA group, and a bevy of good-spirited, excited youth; however, it is clear that these youth are not present in the numbers that many may have been familiar with in years' past. This is congruent with the experience of many Christian communities, particularly in the U.S. While we have been successful in reaching those in need on the digital frontier (with near-11,000 subscribers on YouTube), it is undeniable that we must also fortify our local "frontier" at the community level with an expanded focus on youth programs and offerings.

My assigned focus for the first year of this journey was to research and develop solutions to facilitate an ongoing foundation for youth activity. From New York to Texas, we corresponded with Orthodox Churches that showcase successful youth/young adult programs and facilities (including Orthodox schools) to explore and learn their best practices for success.

Which brings up the big question: based on our findings, how do we attract the youth to be active participants for the future of our community? My answer, that I have proposed to our Parish Council, based on my past

youth worker experience and what I have found at other Orthodox parishes, is to create a space that will lean into their interests and facilitate interaction. This idea is validated by the success stories in the Buffalo Life Center and Houston's St. George Orthodox Church and Annunciation Greek Orthodox church. These facilities host large teen rooms with features such as: board games, pool tables, table tennis, foosball, approved video games, televisions, projectors, library, crafts, and more. Additionally, they support contemporary chairs, tables, couches, and lighting that provide a relaxing, inviting atmosphere.

In the three days I was in Houston, I never once saw the Teen Room empty of youth participants (with the proper exception being the Sunday morning Divine Liturgy). Saturday at 9am the room was packed with youths interacting and playing games (and they were not there for any specified event). When I asked them questions, they were very friendly, polite, and displayed the best Orthodox practices.

As impressive as Houston's current room is, their success has enabled them to expand. They are currently well on their way to reach a fundraising goal to build a brand-new facility that will provide a new ballroom and an entire floor dedicated to youth with the additions of a work- out gym, new activities such as air hockey, contemporary lighting effects, and more.

For comparison, the Buffalo Life Center has a more modest Teen Room with additional playground, half-basketball court, and large field for sport. This is supplemented with a children's library and craft center that is currently expanding.

With the application of the best practices that these three Orthodox Churches have demonstrated, in addition to the donations and facilities we already have, we should be able to create a wonderful, dynamic space for our youth. Imagine an activity center where they can be encouraged to interact and play fairly among a bevy of options including a frappe/coffee bar; a study area/library where they can be inspired by the Good News and written Word and further provide opportunities for tutoring programs or craft workshops; or, a small auditorium with a stage to provide a space for community plays and presentations (such as our Christmas play where they will be able to rehearse and perform on the same stage).


A Community Center, would provide the opportunity to host more easily many events such as a weekly Youth Night, karaoke, games, movies, group activities, and more. The events would be a bit more structured to include an Orthodox topic and teen-centric subjects that should be paired with (but not overwhelm) the night's activities where we will encourage a genuine, safe environment where questions can be asked, and topics explored via activity.

We hope that our largest challenge after building this space will be that the youth want to use it too much. We feel that if the biggest problem we face is that our kids want to go to Church a lot, then we have won more than half the battle. We have been doing an excellent job teaching Orthodox and Greek values at Annunciation, but we have a lot of opportunity on the table that we must take advantage of. We provide religious guidance through Sunday School. We provide Greek culture guidance through Greek School, the Festival, Greek Dancing, and more. We need to focus on teen guidance for teen issues in a similar fashion.

As we've stated before, this is the future of our community, and these are the types of interactive, memory-making opportunities that will create strong bonds for OUR future. We live in a digitally isolating world, where community, family, and safety are dissolving at a rapid rate. Giving them their space, oddly enough, can help redirect them toward the stronger bonds of their peers. After all, God is in Community (Communion). Let's do our part to take action to build and strengthen it.

We hope to explore more opportunities like this to continue our training as well as to inspire others to join us in learning this beautiful tradition!







Hall Rental Policy for 962 East.

We are excited and eager to finally be able to safely reopen our beautifully renovated church Hall to our community. However, the new renovations, along with the intent to lease the Hall to non-parishioners also, requires us to establish a higher degree of formality regarding rental of the new Hall. To assist in this transition, we have secured a dedicated Hall Manager, Sara Tone, who will be responsible for maintaining the Hall Lease calendar, process booking for both parishioner and non-parishioner, showing of the Hall and coordinating contract requirements and signatures. Our church secretary is no longer responsible for Hall scheduling or coordinating any Hall lease activities. With this in mind, we are establishing the following set of guidelines when leasing our Hall.

Attached is a pricing schedule and usage guide for both parishioners and non-parishioners. The fee to rent the Hall for a Parishioner in Good Standing is \$500 total. A signed Rental Agreement and payment of lease fee are required to reserve a date. All guests are expected to respect all Hall rules laid out in the Hall Lease Agreement. All trash and food stuffs must be disposed of properly at the end of your event. See the Hall Lease Agreement for specific information on the use of decorations.

To qualify for the parishioner rate, the person leasing the Hall must be a member in Good Standing for the current year. *Member in Good Standing* status requires a stewardship card on file for the current year and a reasonable payment amount made towards the current year's stewardship pledge.

To begin the Hall Lease process please go to the homepage of our Annunciation Church website. At the bottom of the home page, you will see a button labeled "Hall Rental." Click there to fill out the request form and you will then be contacted by our Hall Manager.

Note that use of the Hall for recognized church organizations or ministries is at no cost, however they are still required to complete the <u>Hall reservation form</u>, to ensure their dates are blocked from use by the Hall manager. This form can be accessed at the bottom of the home page of our church website.

Generally speaking, Hall rental includes the following. (Please see the HALL Contract for the full details)

- a) Six (6) hours of rental time
- b) Tables and chairs setup according to a previously agreed upon floor plan*
- c) Limited kitchen access (warming and cold storage privileges only)
- d) Hall cleaned prior to event
- e) Trash bins and bags

The six (6) hours of rental time does not count against setup time and the timing for this should be arranged with the Hall Manager. This rental does not include the following.

- a) Linens for tables, glassware, flatware, and china
- Food service utensils and dishes

Full kitchen privileges requires a \$350 kitchen usage fee if the food will be prepared using the Hall kitchen(s). If the lessee plans on using a catering service that cater, if they are not on the Approved Cater List, must be approved by the Hall Manager prior to use of the Hall kitchen(s).

* Set-up of the hall does not include taking down or removing any tables due to lack of personnel to do this.
Parishioners are free to take down tables but must reset them after the event. Taking tables down could be done through the set-up fee. For non-parishioners events set-up fees are added to the lease price.

We appreciate your patience and understanding as we transition to this new policy which we believe will serve to benefit us both from a financial and community perspective.

Annunciation Policies

MEMORIAL FUNDS DISTRIBUTION POLICY

All monies received during a funeral or memorial service that are made out to the church, that is, checks marked with "Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church" or cash with the envelope marked with "Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church" will be used for purposes in support of church operation.

These could include support of recognized church ministries, sacramental articles purchased for the church proper or for ongoing campaigns such as Hall Renovation or other capita improvements.

If it is desired that these monies are to be used for other wishes that the family may have the family must ensure that they announce that these checks or cash be designated as such.

All monies received for funerals are tracked and family members will receive a listing of those who donated, typically within 40-60 days following the date of the funeral. In addition, for all monies received designated "Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church," donors will receive a letter thanking them for their donation to the church in memory of the deceased.

POLICY FOR DOCUMENT PREPARATION:

There is a required processing charge of \$40 per document. This charge covers research, preparation and routing of documents such as Certificate of Residency, Certificate of Freedom to Marry, Reissued Marriage Certificate, Reissued Baptism Certificate and Certificate of Death. Additional documents are \$20.00 per document.

WEDDINGS:

We have wedding candles in the office for purchase which is required at the time of the ceremony. The donation for the plain one is \$30.00. \$100 would be for the decorated ones. Lena has them in the office. The Stefanas are sold out - Lena does have catalogs for Stefanas in the Office if anyone is interested in shopping on-line.

BAPTISMS:

We also have baptismal candles, \$30 for the large plain candle and \$7 each for the two (2) smaller plain candles. If you are interested in purchasing decorated candles, the larger one is \$50, the two (2) smaller ones are \$25 for the set.

MEMORIALS:

Coffee Hour scheduling for family memorials is the responsibility of the Philoptochos unless other arrangements have been made by the family sponsoring the Memorial. The family which is sponsoring the Memorial is asked to:

- 1. Contact the Parish Secretary to arrange scheduling for Coffee Hour that day. The Secretary will contact the Philoptochos President.
- 2. Arrange for or pay for Coffee Hour food items that are in excess of the standard menu (coffee, drinks, and simple snacks).
- 3. Coordinate the preparation and delivery of Koliva (if used). The Philoptochos or Church office can provide information on persons who can prepare Koliva. The standard rate for the preparation of koliva is \$150.
